The idea is premised on the principle that the universe originates in a string of finite creations creating further finites without there being a true creator of any of it. The idea is illogical and self defeating because it attempts to circumvent the idea of an infinite Creator (a.k.a. the Uncaused

Cause, a.k.a. God) by saying existence is an infinite chain of finites instead of having an infinite origin.
