I posted this when it first came out on a car forum. Here's what I said after a few people posted some things they didn't like:

Quote:I'm a professional web developer and I find it perfect. I run a top of the line laptop with a 17" screen and a secondary 19" screen. My screen resolution is 1440x900 on both screens at the very least. I depend on my workspace while working. Without the help of tabs I'm forced to work a lot slower. At any given time I normally have 10 pages all open, active and being used.

Features like the anti crash feature where only one tab closes save me a lot of time. I work with a lot of "rich" websites and the multi-threading really seems to hit home and I can see on those pages how its faster then firefox.

I can't say I ever use a sidebar because I find they take away from my work area. I do use bookmarks as well as quick link folders. Chrome makes it really easy to use both of these so I'm sold there as well.

I don't mess with security settings for browsers. Generally I go with the least security possible because when I work I know exactly what I'm getting into and I know exactly what to avoid. That's why I also don't run antivirus or anti spyware programs. I have them but the process's are locked

out unless I turn them on.

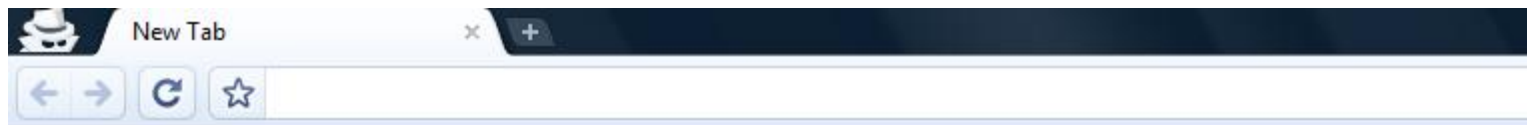
